Freshman Year

- Create a PEP plan
- Establish good study habits
- Ask questions!
- Complete 20 hours of community service
- Discover the available CTE programs: Agricultural Science and Technology, Health Science, Construction Technology, Visual Arts
- Meet with your counselor, Mrs. Broadhurst
- Get involved in extracurricular activities
- Focus on your grades. Having a good GPA (grade point average) will keep your college/career options more open!



Sophomore Year

- Stay committed to your grades and to graduating
- If you haven't yet, this is the year to get involved in CTE!
- Take the YouScience aptitude assessment
- Update your PEP plan
- Complete 30 hours of community service
- Take the PSAT in October
- Participate in clubs, sports, and volunteer (this will help you get scholarships!)
- Start thinking... university, community college, trade program?



Junior Year

- Meet with your counselor, Mrs. Broadhurst, to make sure you are on track to graduate
- Look into taking College Credit Now (CCN) or Dual Credit classes
- Update PEP plan
- Complete 30 hours of community service
- Retake the PSAT
- Take the SAT or ACT in the spring
- Create a list of potential colleges, trade schools, & apprenticeships
- Request information from colleges and schedule campus tours
- Become familiar with college admission requirements
- Attend college and career fairs



Senior Year

- Keep your grades up and finish strong!
- Complete 40 hours of community service
- Take the SAT or ACT and send scores to your top colleges
- Finalize your college list, understand admission requirements, and plan for deadlines
- Write college admission essays
- Request high school transcripts
- Apply to colleges & universities, trade programs, and apprenticeships
- Take the YouScience aptitude assessment again & complete PEP plan
- Attend the fall or spring Financial Aid Night & complete the FAFSA and/or ORSAA application



Financial Aid

FAFSA & ORSAA

- Opens October 1st every year
- Deadline June 30th
- Fill out the FAFSA if you are a U.S. Citizen
- Fill out the ORSAA if you are an Oregon resident who has undocumented status, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status, and/or Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
- Visit: oregonstudentaid.gov

Oregon Promise Grant

- Tuition assistance for up to 90 college credits
- Open October 1—June 30
- Minimum 2.50 GPA

Oregon Opportunity Grant

 Needs based grant given on a first come, first serve basis when you file your FAFSA

Scholarships

Improve your chances at getting a scholarship...

- 1. The harder the application, the fewer applications they receive... giving you a higher chance at earning the scholarship.
- 2. Use filters and keywords to find the scholarships that best fit your qualifications, experiences, background, or unique interests.
- 3. Look beyond your GPA and think about what special skills or talents you have.
- 4. Scholarships with smaller rewards typically have fewer applicants, giving you a higher chance of winning. The smaller rewards add up quickly and can help cover living expenses and books!


Get better prepared for a successful transition into a postsecondary program by joining one of the CTE pathways offered at Gervais High School.

Mrs. Dilson


- Opportunities to compete, travel, and apply skills to real life application outside of the classroom
